In conjunction with our speaker, David Gregg of The Rhode Island Natural History Survey, we used counting skills to learn the basics of weaving to make a bracelet or bookmark.

Supplies

mini handmade loom (10" x 8" cardboard with 12 strings pulled tight across 1.5") crochet thread (warp) colorful embroidery floss (weft) comb blunt end needle

Directions

- 1. Measure your wrist if you want to weave a bracelet.
- 2. Thread your needle with 24" of embroidery floss.
- 3. Test which style of weaving you like on your warp (the vertical threads) which is made of crochet thread. Over and under every thread, over and under every 2 threads, feel free to experiment!
- 4. Tie a row of knots at the end of your mini loom against the small raised cardboard to secure your head of your project. The video link at the end gives a good tutorial.
- 5. Start weaving your project with your embroidery floss. Make sure every shot (pass through) is opposite of the one before to cover your white warp threads.
- 6. Use your comb as a beater to push every shot together tightly against your knot line.
- 7. Keep floss tails at the selvedges 5"-6" so we can weave them back in at the end.
- 8. Switch colors whenever, just remember to leave enough floss to weave back in at the end.
- 9. Keep your selvedges (width ends) neat and in a straight line. The width of your bracelet should remain at 1.5" throughout.
- 10. Secure the end with another row of knots.
- 11. Flip your loom upside down and cut your warp in the center.
- 12. Braid or twist your crochet thread to finish off the bracelet.
